

# Scholarship News

## OUR SCHOLARS MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Scholarship reports for the 2019-2020 academic year from the nine students who received awards from the Anglo-Danish Society, including one from the Ove Arup Foundation, have now been posted on our website [www.anglo-danishsociety.org.uk](http://www.anglo-danishsociety.org.uk)

Cold Climate Engineering and Pathology - Screenwriting and Nanoscience – Biology and Violin Performance - Music Composition and Translational Neuroscience: the summaries provide an insight into areas of research that are far removed from most people's daily lives. As such, they make for fascinating reading.

Matthew Grouse, who is studying for a MMus in Composition at the Royal Academy of Music in Aarhus, mirrors the gratitude of all the recipients who each received £2,500: "I honestly can't thank the Society enough for the support, especially at the moment with everything that's going on with the pandemic. It's genuinely been a life-changing scholarship."

Applications for scholarships for the academic year 2021-2022 are now open. Eight are non-subject specific and are sponsored by the Anglo-Danish Society. The Ove Arup Foundation, a long-standing partner, sponsors one award for advanced studies in the Built Environment. The William Charn-

ley Anglo-Danish Scholarship, arranged as part of our 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Appeal in December 2019, is awarded for study at postgraduate level in a subject taken at Hughes Hall, Cambridge University. Unfortunately, the ACE Foundation scholarship which was offered last year is a victim of the pandemic and is no longer available.

Application forms for the next academic year are available from our website. The deadline is 1<sup>st</sup> March 2021. All applications will be scrutinised and selected by the Anglo-Danish Society's Scholarship Committee. The deadline for the William Charnley Anglo-Danish Scholarship is 30<sup>th</sup> June 2021 and the selection will be carried out by Hughes Hall on behalf of the Anglo-Danish Society.

## COUNCIL NEWS

Following the AGM in September we welcome **CONNIE YILMAZ JANTZEN** as the new Ex-Officio member for Dansk KFUK (Danish YWCA). The A-DS postal address continues to be at Dansk KFUK.

**PALLE BAGGESGAARD-PEDERSEN** was elected on to council in his own right after years as the KFUK representative. Palle has taken over Website Management from Margit Stæhr and is in charge of Newsletter Layout.

**PROFESSOR JAKOB STOUGAARD-NIELSEN** has been appointed Honorary Member and new member of The Scholarship Committee, taking up the vacancy left by Dr Claire Thomson. Jakob is Professor of Scandinavian and Comparative Literature and Director of UCL Scandinavian Studies at UCL.

Jacob's own introduction:

"I grew up in Nyborg on the Danish island of Fyn in the 1970s. In the early 1990s, I went to Aarhus University to study Comparative Literature. I became fascinated with literatures in English and literary theory, which took me to Cardiff University as an Erasmus student and to University of Illinois, Chicago, as a Fulbright scholar before I completed my degree in Comparative Literature and English with studies at University of Copenhagen in 1998. Following my MA degree, I held various teaching positions at Aarhus University, at a Danish Teachers' college and a visiting lectureship in Danish at University of Washington (2001-4). In 2004, I received funding for a PhD project at Aarhus University, which I completed with a thesis on Henry James in 2007

In 2010, I became a lecturer in Scandinavian Literature at UCL following three years as a teaching fellow in Danish in the Department of Scandinavian Studies. In my time at UCL, I have been co-Chair of a multidisciplinary research programme and deputy director of the UCL Institute for Advanced Studies. I was Undergraduate Tutor in the School of European Languages, Culture and Society (2010-2) and have been Programme Director for several degrees including my current position as Director of Scandinavian Studies. In 2010, I founded the Nordic Noir Book Club in London, and I have published books and articles on Scandinavian crime fiction, translation studies and Hans Christian Andersen. Currently, I am a member of the Executive Board of the British Comparative Literature Association and, since 2020, I am Professor of Scandinavian and Comparative Literature."

# Queen Margrethe's Artistic Talent

It is easy to imagine that, while snow and Covid puts a dampener on everyone's activities, HM Queen Margrethe continues her prolific output of all types of artistic expression. Over many years the queen has acted as the in-house set designer for the Pantomime Theatre in Tivoli, Copenhagen. She has designed costumes and scenery for many varied productions of theatre, opera and ballet including *The Nutcracker*, *Romeo and Juliet*, *Thumbelina* and *The Steadfast Tin Soldier*.

However, the Queen's abundant creativity also includes pictorial art such as portraits, floral symbolism and landscapes. Queen Margrethe's famed water-colour artwork was displayed on Greenland's postage stamps.



"I've always loved the landscape, and as a child what I really wanted to do was draw landscapes when we had drawing lessons," says the Queen of her lifelong desire to paint.

An avid and passionate reader HM Queen Margrethe translated, in collaboration with her French-born husband, Prince Henrik, Simone de Beauvoir's 1946 novel, *All Men Are Mortal* and illustrated several books.

While still a crown princess, Margrethe illustrated *Lord of the Rings* with drawings printed under her pen name Ingahild Grathmer. J.R.R. Tolkien had no idea the

charming artwork had a royal provenance and went on to use them in both British and Danish editions. Queen Margrethe has also been a prolific creator of religious robes and fabrics for churches throughout Denmark, Norway and Germany and, most recently, The Danish Church in London.

A true Renaissance monarch, Queen Margrethe has been a lifelong, largely self-taught, student of art – not just archeology and political science as an undergraduate at Cambridge.

# New Vestment for The Danish Church

HM Queen Margrethe has long been known for her varied artistic talents. Recently, the Queen designed and embroidered a vestment (chasuble or robe) specifically for The Danish Church in London. In December 2020 HM had planned to have personally 'delivered' the creation and attended the festive ceremony when the vestment was first used. Clearly, once again, Covid-19 got in the way, but a festive inaugural service took place for the 25 permitted participants and many more via Zoom.

HM began the process a year earlier when visiting St Katharine's in Regents Park. She took note of the colours, glass mosaics and traditional colours associated with UK and Denmark. The white cross on the red background represents Denmark and reflects the colours of the great mosaic above the alter. The lining is blue, thus reflecting the British colours, too.

On the front, HM has embroidered a monogram based on the first three Greek letters in Jesus' name, surrounded by a crown of thorns.

On the back, the embroidered cross has a Luther rose at the centre, a widely known symbol for Lutheranism within the Evangelical Lutheran Church.

The swirling floral vines in the English fabric echoes the 200-year-old neogothic church architecture. Queen Margrethe intended the design to be appropriate for all festive occasions at any time of year.

# Pining for Denmark and Danish Foods

Member Jenny Deane shared her thoughts during lockdown:

Sometimes I long for Denmark. I long for the flat, open roads of Bornholm carving gently through fields of ripening corn; the roadsides blue with wild chicory the colour of the sky. I long for the thick, dark pine woods with their backs to the sea, their twisted roots pushing through the white sands of Dueodde and I dream of the long, warm dunes at sunset, the cold Baltic sea between my toes; the small wooden summerhouses with their lace curtains and geraniums at the windows. I dream of red and yellow houses, side by side along narrow cobbled streets, bicycles propped carelessly against their old walls.



And I long, always, for the green copper spires of Copenhagen; the small squares and fountains; the peaceful churchyard where my Grandmother sleeps. I dream of flaxen-haired girls in summer dresses strolling hand in hand along Store Kongensgade, honey-skinned and laughing. I dream of herrings and a tall, cloudy glass of ice-cold aquavit in Nyhavn, old haunt of sailors and drunks and now full of smart restaurants and sandwiches piled high with salad and prawns.



I long for Tivoli, not at night as many do, but in the morning when old ladies drink coffee and smoke cigars and the magic is in the fountains and the lakes and the flowers and the daytime music. I dream of the long

beautiful drive up the coast of Sjælland; of small sailing ships upon the sparkling waters of the Sound; of shooting stars at midnight when the sky is still light. This was the Denmark my father knew and loved, the Denmark of my youth and the Denmark which still makes my heart ache with a longing I cannot explain.


## AN EVENING WITH SCANDINAVIAN AUTHORS DISCUSSING THEIR BOOKS
