In so many ways we are on the cusp of something new and exciting, in society generally and in our Anglo-Danish Society. We say farewell to Ambassador and President of The Anglo-Danish Society Lars Thuesen and welcome the new Ambassador, René Dinesen. Council members retire and new ones arrive. More council members are needed, as we hope to refresh and enhance the work of the society. Please feel free to volunteer or nominate members who are keen to ensure that the society will go forward to its centenary in 2024 with energy and new initiatives.

In this year of jubilees, the culmination for The Anglo-Danish Society will be the 'Royal Jubilee Afternoon Tea Party' in the gardens at Drapers' Hall. We sincerely hope that many of you will be able to join us to mark this unique event which promises to be festive and special in many ways. The sandwiches will be mouthwateringly tasty, the scones and cakes delicious and the tea and bubbles served by waiters - rather than a clumsy bear! If you're wondering what I'm referring to, you must have missed the sketch in which the Queen and Paddington Bear take tea together as shown at the 'Platinum Concert at the Palace'.

A memorial stone for Fallen Danes is to be erected in the grounds of the Danish Church next May. It will stand as a smaller echo of the Jelling Stone copy, and will be the focus of future commemorations every May. Through a community collection, you will be able to support this honouring of all Danes who paid the ultimate price for freedom.

At the recent AGM, we learnt that Chairman Wayne Harber is looking to step down within the foreseeable future. There seems to be an unscripted tradition that chairmanships alternate between Brits and Danes, so who might be our next chairman? Memberships continue to rise and our finances are healthy and well managed by our Honorary Treasurer, Alan Davey. This will be our main focus over the coming months.

They exude so much talent, enthusiasm and passion for their studies which cover many of the challenges that the world is now facing, including climate change.

On that positive note I would like to say farewell and thank you as I bow out of council and as your society's honorary secretary, editor and event manager. I have enjoyed my years as part of this remarkable family and made many friends along the way. It has been an honour and a privilege and in so many ways, I will miss the friendly interaction with you all. I would urge you to consider taking on a role on council, though perhaps not all of them at the same time! I wish you the members, friends of the society and everyone on council all the very best for the future.



ADS SCHOLAR WINS

THE LÉONIE SONNING MUSIC PRIZE

Denmark's prestigious Léonie Sonning music prize for 2022 has been awarded to Magnus Plejdrup, one of our current scholars. Magnus is currently studying for a Master's degree in Orchestral Conducting at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland.

The Léonie Sonning music prize has been given to internationally acclaimed composers, musicians, conductors or singers within classical music since 1959.

From a young boy who "hated classical music" to a serious student of classical composition at the Royal Academy of Music in Aarhus, Magnus, 27, was appointed Artistic Director and conductor of the chamber orchestra, Ensemble Puma, in September 2018. His compositions have been performed by several orchestras in Denmark and he was the winner of the Danish Sinfonietta's Public Choice award for composers on the occasion of its 75th anniversary. Magnus collected the Léonie Sonning music prize the day after he attended the Danish Ambassador's reception on May 19th.

"I'm very grateful to the Anglo-Danish Society for their support," says Magnus. "The funding I received enabled me to go to Scotland to develop my artistic career. My current achievements have — in no small way — been made possible by the Society's scholarship."



New book: Claus Dalby

CONTAINER GARDENING - THE DANISH WAY

Council News: Lone Britt Christensen

LONE BRITT CHRISTENSEN, CULTURAL ATTACHÉ – CELEBRATING 25 YEARS AT THE DANISH EMBASSY



Lone has been an ex-officio member of the Anglo-Danish Society council since 2006, representing the Danish Embassy and advising and informing the council on a wide variety of cultural activities in London and the UK.

Back in 1996 Lone started as an intern at the embassy and was appointed Cultural and Press Officer in 1997. By then, she had completed her MA in English and Economics at University of Southern Denmark and Trinity College, University College Dublin. In 2006 Lone took up the position of Head of Section, Press and Cultural Attaché. It was at the time when Denmark attracted a

lot of media attention due to the Danish cartoon crisis. Since 2012 Lone has solely been focusing on 'soft diplomacy' as the Cultural Attaché.

Over the years Lone has been involved in a number of high-profile cultural collaborations for the embassy and for The Anglo-Danish Society. Events include Vilhelm Hammershøi and New Carlsberg Glyptotek exhibitions at the Royal Academy, Christen Købke at the National Gallery, Superflex, Olafur Eliasson and Per Kirkeby at Tate Modern and Elmgreen and Dragset at Serpentine, V&A and Whitechapel Gallery.

Striving to connect Danish artists and arts organisations in a UK context and looking for opportunities within the arts, she has initiated and taken the lead on larger projects over the years. They include a year-long project on Nordic Matters at the Southbank Centre in collaboration with the Nordic Council of Ministers, new cultural partnerships with the Arts Council of England between the cities of Manchester, Aalborg and Aarhus and more recently also between York, Bradford and Viborg.

This autumn, a new book will be published on the architecture and art at the Embassy of Denmark, which was designed by Arne Jacobsen. The book will be published by The Danish Architectural Press (Arkitektens Forlag) and includes newly commissioned photographs of the embassy and articles by scholars and academics.

Whenever the Queen of Denmark is on a private visit to London, Lone is responsible for the cultural programme for HM as well as for visiting delegations from the Danish Parliament's Cultural Committee, the Minister for Culture and other officials.

We congratulate Lone on her quarter century anniversary at the embassy and are extremely grateful for her continued work for The Anglo-Danish Society.

New Ambassador

From September, Denmark's new Ambassador to the UK will be René Rosager Dinesen whose previous posting was as Ambassador to Austria with additional responsibility for Slovakia, Albania and Kosovo. René Dinesen was previously Ambassador to South Africa and Afghanistan.

Council News: Certificate of Merit

PALLE BAGGESGAARD-PEDERSEN WINS CERTIFICATE OF MERIT

This year, a Certificate of Merit was awarded to a member of The Anglo-Danish Society for the first time. Chairman Wayne Harber introduced the award as one which will be given to someone who has made a special and sustained effort in support of our society. No one deserves it more than Palle. He has devoted many hours to publishing our newsletters in both digital and printed versions from basic Word documents and posts regular updates on our website. Palle has an eye for design. He is creative and cares about how our presentations appear to our readers.

Palle has served on council for 'a lifetime' and has performed many different roles, both when still manager at KFUK and since his retirement. We are grateful for all he continues to do for A-DS.



Arne Jacobsen's Favourite Building

JAMES BENNETT FROM ST CATHERINE'S COLLEGE OXFORD WRITES:

We are told that St Catherine's College, Oxford, was Arne Jacobsen's favourite amongst all the buildings he designed. Pevsner, when writing about the College in his 1974 Oxfordshire, described it as a "perfect piece of architecture". High praise indeed. St Catherine's is an architectural masterpiece but the College is a great deal more than that. It represents the beginning of a new phase in university architecture in the United Kingdom, demonstrating the humane and democratic values of the 1960s expansion of university education to a wider social group than previously had access to tertiary education. It does this in the guise of a stunning example of European modernism with Danish roots.

The choice of Arne Jacobsen was controversial. Lord Bullock, the founding Master of the College, in an unpublished paper "On being a client" wrote "playing safe was much more likely to arouse criticism than striking out in a new direction". Appointing Arne was not playing safe. There is a letter to the Times which complained that the appointment was the greatest insult to English architecture since the choice of William of Sens to build Canterbury Cathedral in the 1170s.

There is an interesting and unexpected background to the choice of Arne Jacobsen. Again, from Alan Bullock, reflecting on his trip to Denmark to look at the work of possible architects following a visit to Munkegaard School. "I have never seen a school more perfectly fitted – in its scale, in the use of materials and colour, and the planting of its courtyards – to make children feel at home. From the moment I walked into Munkegaard School, I felt convinced that after nearly two years of looking we had found the architect we wanted".

St Catherine's is a veritable treasure-house of, and showcase for, Danish design. Arne Jacobsen, working





with Fritz Hansen, specially designed furniture for student bedrooms and public spaces. Both the Junior and Senior Common Rooms are fitted with Series 3300 chairs and sofas – those in the Senior Common Room date back to the 1960s and still sit exactly as Arne Jacobsen arranged them. Louis Poulsen produced lighting for the tables in the dining hall. The College was fortunate to benefit from being supplied with products designed by Jacobsen for his other projects. Silver cutlery produced by Michelsen for the SAS Hotel used at our High Table; steel cutlery, now produced by Georg Jensen; items from the Stelton Cylinda line range; taps by Vola; fabrics from Kvadrat; door handles now supplied by d line.

The design of the College, now in 2022 after 60 years of accommodating students, shows that the decisions of the architect and his clients were well-made. It serves its purpose as well now as it did in the early 1960s. This was due to the close working relationship that developed between Bullock — who knew what was needed in terms of the functions of a college and Jacobsen — who knew how to order space and the materials that go together to make the perfect architecture to house those activities.

A CONFERENCE AT ST CATHERINE'S COLLEGE, OXFORD SATURDAY 27 AUGUST 2022

On Saturday 27 August 2022, the College will be hosting a one-day conference in celebration of the 60th anniversary of its opening. The conference will focus on Arne Jacobsen's work at St Catherine's both in its 1960s context and as seen in the present-day from the perspectives of both the UK and Denmark.

Central to the day's talks will be an opportunity to hear from the members of Arne Jacobsen's studio about their work with the architect and their own roles in the design and construction of the College.

The event will provide an opportunity to see demonstrations of the College's work to digitise, and make publicly available its collection of Jacobsen's drawings.

The day will close with a gala dinner in the College Hall and a night's stay in College. Opportunities to join guided tours of the College buildings and grounds (including parts not normally open to the general public) will be open the following morning, Sunday 28 August 2022.

A THANK YOU FROM AND TO THE DUCHESS OF GLOUCESTER



They shall never be forgotten

COMMUNITY FUNDING FOR A MEMORIAL IN REMEMBRANCE OF DANES WHO HAVE FALLEN IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY.

The Danish community in London are coming together to erect a memorial in remembrance of the Danes who have fallen in the service of their country.

To celebrate their lives and their memory, and to commemorate both civilians and military service personnel, The Anglo-Danish Society, The Danish Church in London, The Danish Royal Guards Association, and the Danish-UK Association will together erect a memorial in the grounds of the Danish Church in London.

The memorial is a stone, approximately 1.5 meters tall and made from granite. The stone will be erected in the garden of the Danish Church in London at a cost of approximately £12,500.

We now need your support to buy and erect the memorial. Funds have already been pledged, and in the typical community spirit we are all known for, we welcome any support big or small.

GREAT DANE ANGLO-DANISH SOCIETY STUDENT SECTION REUNION

In 1951, when The Anglo-Danish Society had been running for 27 years, a Student Section of the society was formed. It became a subsidiary club for Brits and Danes under the age of 30. For many years, Territorial Army Headquarters in 56 Davies Street was the regular Tuesday evening meeting place where the bar was open, the disco and live music blaring and where many Anglo -Danish relationships were formed. Most Danes were either au-pairs or students at the Købmandsskole in Ealing. It was often said, very non-PC, that the reason the Brits were there, mostly men, was because, "The club has the cheapest beer and the prettiest girls in all of London."

In the 1970s, the club was renamed 'Great Dane', to get around the longwinded title of 'The Anglo-Danish Society Student Section'. A 'Great Dane Handball Team' was formed, introducing UK youngsters to handball. The game took off and the team is still in existence though no longer connected to A-DS.

The club's 25th anniversary in 1976 was a disco-party-reception for 90 people+ on HMS Belfast, moored in the Thames. Every Easter the club arranged a 10-day mini-bus trip to Scotland, as well as trips to Oxford, Cambridge, Brighton, Land's End and Mayday trips to Padstow.

Sadly, the IRA bomb threats meant that the club could no longer safely stay on the army premises and so a number of years as 'nomads' ensued. Every Tuesday members met at The Albany Pub by Great Portland Street, then The Danish Club in Knightsbridge and many other places across London till one day, in the eighties, the club folded.



There are plans to celebrate the 70th anniversary of the club's formation on Tuesday 15th November 2022, with an informal gathering at a pub in Central London. DANISH ROYAL JUBILEE EXPEDITION TERMINATES IN AARHUS

One way to mark the jubilee of HM Queen Margrethe's 50 years on the throne this year was to take the royal yacht Dannebrog on a summer cruise to many towns and ports around Denmark. The royal yacht Dannebrog also marked its own jubilee, as it is 90 years ago that the royal ensign was first raised on the royal yacht. For nine decades the yacht has sailed as both official and private residence for Christian X, Frederik IX and now for Margrethe II.



Aarhus Harbour was the last stop on the jubilee tour. When Her Majesty disembarked, there were further celebrations ahead: a Michelin starred lunch on top of an as yet unfinished skyscraper by the harbour, a horse drawn carriage procession with 50 royal guard riders, and several outdoor parties. Aarhus welcomed the Queen, who again took up residence at Marselisborg Castle where she often stays for extended periods, particularly over Christmas and Easter. Every day during her residence at Marselisborg, there is a daily Life Guards' changing of the guard at the palace.

To mark the jubilee, four benefactors from Aarhus gave 40 million kroner to the Queen as a present





towards a thorough renovation of the palace to secure its future as a royal residence and a public park whenever the royal family are not in residence. The park contains many pieces of art alongside the extensive rose garden and trees. The palace itself needs a new copper roof, new spires and windows as well as energy friendly updating. The building of the palace started originally in 1899





Why spanish soldiers fortified Langeland

In 1807 after the British had besieged and bombed Copenhagen, Denmark was firmly an ally of the French Emperor Napoleon, as indeed was Spain. Napoleon needed both these countries to enforce his Continental System, denying Britain access to European markets for trade.

Napoleon asked for and got a Spanish division of 15,000 troops, infantry, cavalry and artillery, to be sent to the Baltic to resist invasion by British forces. The Division's commander was the 46-year old Pedro, Marques de La Romana. The Spanish division arrived in its winter quarters around Hamburg in November 1807.

In March 1808 the Spanish troops entered Denmark with the regiment dispersed around the country. Unlike in their home country, their pay was generous and regular as were their rations. After some initial caution they struck up friendly relations with the local Danes. Using a little German and some mime, both sides made themselves understood. They got on well, but the Danes did worry about fire risk from the Spaniards chain smoking cigarettes. During the cold winter it is said that the shivering Spaniards accidentally burnt down Koldinghus Castle on 30th March.

Back in Spain there were worrying developments. Napoleon had pressured the Spanish Royal family into abdicating. There was a huge uprising in Madrid on 2nd May during which many French and Spanish troops were killed. Napoleon put his elder brother Joseph on the Spanish throne, which was deeply unpopular.

Back in Denmark, Spanish officers noticed their letters from home were being censored, but the bad news from Madrid did get back to them.

The Corps commander, French Marshal Bernadotte (later to become the Crown Prince of Sweden), in





mid-June wrote to the Marques de La Romana, insisting that all Spanish troops must take an oath of loyalty to their new King Joseph Bonaparte.

De La Romana was evasive and his troops were close to rebellion. Meanwhile, a Spanish officer had gone aboard a Royal Navy ship HMS Edgar near Nyborg and suggested that the Navy evacuate Spanish troops from Langeland and sail them back to Spain.

In great secrecy De La Romana issued orders for his regiments spread out over Denmark to head for Langeland and secure the port of Nyborg. The excuse being they were to come together to take the oath. The Spanish soldiers disarmed the few Danish and French soldiers stationed on Langeland and prepared defences. Sixty- five ships, some of them captured from the Danes under the command of Rear Admiral Keats, embarked the Marques de La Romana and 10,000 of his soldiers by the 11th August. The other 5,000 were unable to reach Langeland and were disarmed by the French and Danes.

The French had been completely fooled, there was no bloodshed and the Royal Navy sailed de La Romana and his soldiers to Santander in Spain where they fought against the French alongside British and Portuguese soldiers to liberate Spain.
